H'heads man dies in Alfred fight

ALFRED | A senior at Alfred University died early Sunday morning after a fight outside a home on North Main Street in Alfred.

Thomas Argentieri, 21, of Horseheads, was taken by ambulance to St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell after the fight, where he was pronounced dead, according to Alfred Police.

Alfred Police were called to the home, located at 57 N. Main St., at 3:30 a.m. Sunday.

No charges had been filed as of Sunday evening, and police are not releasing the name of the individual, also a student, that Argentieri fought with before his death. The student was questioned and released.

"There was a 911 call reporting an unresponsive male, who was in the kitchen by the time the ambulance

got there," said Allegany County District Attorney Terrence Parker. "It was alleged there was an altercation (involving) the now-deceased. It was alleged (Argentieri) struck another person with a beer bottle, and then struck him a second time which caused him to have a cut to his face.

"After he was cut in the face, he grabbed a hold of (Argentieri), who struck him," Parker continued. "There was a struggle, they went to the ground, he struck (Argentieri) a couple times."

At this point, Parker said the fight was broken apart and the student who was struck by the bottle was

"The kid who got the cut was told, 'You're hurt, we need to get you inside and stop the bleeding,' and as they went inside, they noticed (Argentieri) did not get up," Parker said. When they realized this, they got (Argentieri) into the kitchen and

Argentieri's body was sent to the Monroe County Medical Examiners' Office in Rochester for an autopsy.

Parker said a preliminary report will be completed by Tuesday, but more tests, including toxicology results, will be needed before he can consider charges.

Parker said the person who fought with Argentieri is from downstate, near New York City.

The role alcohol may have played in Sunday's incident has yet to be determined, Parker said.

An empty beer can was visible in front of 57 North Main St. on Sunday, and a bottle of wine was sitting on the front porch. Also visible from the road were several beer cans and bottles inside the front window on a counter.

CORNING | Sleet and freezing rain caused a slew of accidents on area highways Sunday, and a winter weather advisory issued by the National Weather Service was to remain in effect until 7 a.m. today.

Police, fire departments and ambulances responded to multiple accidents, including several that slowed traffic on Interstate Highway 86 in Painted Post and Corning early evening.
