Swine flu in Cortland County?

BATH | Cortland County Health officials are awaiting test results to determine whether swine flu has come to upstate New York.

In a press release, Cortland County Health Department officials said they sent samples from two suspected cases to the state Department of Health laboratory in Wadsworth Monday.

They are also investigating a third case, which they say is unrelated to the other two.

No other details about the suspected cases were available at press time.

If any of the cases are determined to be swine flu, it would be the first confirmed in upstate New York. A total of 45 cases have been confirmed in New York City.

Equal pay still an issue in 2009

ELMIRA | The good news is that women are a penny richer than they were in 2008.

The bad news is that women in this country still make only 78 cents for every \$1 that a man makes - for the same work. And it's worse for women of color. Black women make 68 cents and Hispanic women make 57 cents to that \$1.

That's why each year on April 28, Equal Pay Day is observed, to show the date that women finally earn as much as men earned by Dec. 31 of the previous year.

"You would think that in 2009, with as far as we've

come, equal pay would not be an issue. ... People don't realize that women's salaries are still so far behind men's,' Chemung County Executive Tom Santulli said.

Santulli was one of about 30 people gathered Tuesday at the Steele Memorial Library in Elmira to observe Equal Pay Day at a luncheon/discussion hosted by the Elmira-Corning Association of American University Women.

More than half the attendees were wearing red, as is traditionally done every April 28, "to show that women are still in the red," said June
