he family of Cliff Kent Sr., a local dairy farmer killed in a tractor accident last week, is going through an incredibly tough time.

Kent's calling hours and funeral were held last weekend, and the family is dealing with financial and legal matters.

On top of all that, his two sons have been trying to keep the farm running, but

are facing a tall task. Although they've always helped out, Kent was the mastermind and backbone of the operation, especially when it came to crop management, said his son, Cliff Kent Jr.

But this week, a group of fellow farmers and longtime friends got together to help the family plant 120 acres of corn and other crops needed to sustain the dairy herd on several large swaths of land
