Plan shows possible sites for development

CORNING | What's the future of economic development along the Interstate Highway 86/99 corridor in Southeast Steuben

No one knows for sure but the Three Rivers Development Corp. has identified and mapped out potential sites for economic development that could possibly occur in the next 10 to 15 years.

Three Rivers officials rolled out its Economic Development Blueprint Thursday encompassing seven municipalities that border the Interstate Highway 86/99 corridor.

The 43-page document identifies 16 areas along the corridor that would be suitable for future development for manufacturing, retail, tourism, business and commercial uses.

The study was driven by the \$400 million federal and state governments have spent on interstate highway projects in our area, said Jack Benjamin, president of Three Rivers Development Corp., which spearheaded the study.

"The rationale was to put



together a plan that takes advantage of that investment," Benjamin said. "Our access to two interstates presents an unusual opportunity. Businesses want to be located near exits.'

In addition to the interstates, Whit Smith, of Corning Inc., said the existing railway system also makes this corner of the county desirable to industry looking to expand or relocate.

"The natural railway

rights of way are huge as far attracting industry,' Smith said.

Benjamin said the blueprint will be used to attract new business.

'The end game is, not only do we have a plan for the interstate, we have a marketing tool for southeast Steuben County for the next 10 to 15 years,'

Benjamin said. The document contains

NRCC: Reed running for Congress

CORNING | Mayor Tom Reed won't say yet whether or

not he is running for Congress, but the National Republican Congressional Committee claims he is a

candidate and is currently accepting money on his

The National Republican Congressional Committee has named Reed as one of four House Republican Young Guns to challenge Democrat incumbents.

The NRCC sent out a mass e-mail Thursday seeking donations on behalf of Reed and three other candidates from areas in Alabama, California and Illinois.

"Because of your generosity we have been able to recruit excellent candidates across the country including ... Mayor of Corning, N.Y. - Tom Reed," the solicitation said.

Signs have existed for weeks that Reed, 37, is preparing to run against freshman U.S. Rep. Eric Massa, D-Corning, in the 2010 election. Reed is in his first term as mayor, the only public office he has held.

Reed previously said he will not seek re-election and he will announce his political plans by Wednesday.

Several sources expect him to commit to an all-out campaign next week.

"I can see why people would identify him as someone to look at for future leadership," said Phil Palmesano, Corning City Republican chairman. "I haven't talked to him specifically about this,

Jackson, 'King of Pop' dies at 50 in hospital

LOS ANGELES | Michael Jackson, the sensationally gifted child star who rose to become the "King of Pop" and the biggest celebrity in the world only to fall from his throne in a freakish series of scandals, died Thursday. He was 50.

Jackson died at UCLA Medical Center after being stricken at his rented home in Holmby Hills. Paramedics tried to resuscitate him at his home for nearly three-quarters of an hour, then rushed him to the hospital, where doctors
