Corning Inc. Consolidation causes job cuts

CORNING | White-collar job cuts caused by the ongoing consolidation of two Corning Inc. operations are currently under way.

Dan Collins, company spokesman, said the majority of the positions will be eliminated by offering early retirement incentives.

"This week a series of meetings with employees are being held," Collins said Tuesday. "Some employees will be reassigned, others will be offered early retirement and some positions will be eliminated.

Corning Inc. officials announced in late July plans to merge a pair of operations that build emission control devices for automobiles and large vehicles, leading to the job cuts.

Collins said the job cuts caused by the consolidation are part of the 640 local employees Corning Inc. officials estimated in January would be cut by the end of the year.

The drop in worldwide

automotive sales forced Corning Inc. to merge the two segments to reduce costs and increase manufacturing effi-

ciencies. "The majority of the people impacted are being offered early retirement plans," Collins said. "The work force reductions will impact salary workers and not hourly workers."

Collins said the number of job losses has not yet been determined.

Massa, D-Corning, cited a few reasons during a conference call Tuesday why he thinks it's wrong that Reed is receiving \$1.18 million in a Restore New York grant to refurbish the Masonic Lodge

in the village. Massa said elected officials accepting public money to turn a profit creates a conflict and added that Reed also criticized the future use of federal stimulus money after accepting the state grant.

"I have never heard of a case where an incumbent mayor accepts a grant for an economic project that he or she will benefit by," Massa said. "That would be like me using federal stimulus money to repave my driveway."

Reed, a Republican, is challenging Massa in the 2010









