TOWANDA, PA. | A woman was found not guilty Wednesday of involuntary manslaughter in connection with her mother's death last summer in Sayre.

She was, however, convicted in Bradford County Court on two lesser charges.

Josephine Parkhurst Boice was found guilty of aggravated assault and simple assault. She was accused of shoving her elderly mother. Rose Parkhurst, who fell and later died at Robert Packer Hospital.

Parkhurst Boice testified that she accidentally bumped into her elderly mother, who was frail and had health prob-

The incident occurred Aug. 22, 2007. At the time, the family lived together on East Packer Avenue in Sayre.

Massa blasts Kuhl for using taxpayers' money on mailings

CORNING | Congressional candidate Eric Massa Wednesday blasted members of Congress, including U.S. Rep. John R. "Randy" Kuhl Jr. for spending taxpayer money on unnecessary mailings.

Massa cited an editorial in Canandaigua's Daily Messenger Post which chided Kuhl for putting out a mailing informing district residents about the federal rebate checks.

The Internal Revenue Service sent the same information out in its own mailing shortly before Kuhl's.

"This is out of control Washington spending," Massa said. "This is exactly what has got us in trouble in Washington - this irresponsible, out-of-control spending. election against Massa. This is hundreds of thousands of dollars of unnecessary junk mail mailings being spent by the office representing the 29th Congressional District."

In a press release on his Web site, Kuhl, R-Hammondsport, defended the practice.

"The purpose of the mailer was to inform my constituents about the details of the Economic Stimulus Act of four times against the State 2008," Kuhl said.

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confusion still exists tax rebates. He said nearly 200 residents called office in early

February with questions about the tax rebate which is designed to stimulate the ailing economy. The calls were received before the IRS mailing went out, Kuhl said.

Figures provided by Massa that he said were from the House Governmental Office showed Kuhl spent \$40,000 in the first two quarters of 2007 on mass mailings.

Kuhl spent almost \$130,000 in the first two quarters of 2006, the year Kuhl ran for re-

Massa said the mailer on rebates is only the latest in a string of mailings Kuhl has put out over the past several months. Massa said Kuhl also sent out mailings on reducing dependence on foreign oil, the concerns of Monroe County residents and on children's health coverage.

Voters pass capital plan

HORNELL | Hornell city school district voters have approved a \$52.7 million capital plan that will tighten security, improve education and upgrade the condition of district buildings.

The capital plan was overwhelmingly approved, 763-334, Tuesday by district voters. It received support from nearly 70 percent of voters, exceeding the 60 percent voter approval needed to pass because the district is over its constitutional debt limit.

The project will include building a centralized technology control center at the high school and the installation of internal and external security cameras and universal wireless access in district buildings.

Work at Bryant and North Hornell Elementary, the Intermediate School, the high school and the district offices will include heating, ventilation and maintenance improvements.

A second proposal costing \$8.35 million to build a new bus garage on Park Drive failed to meet the needed 60 percent voter approval. District residents voted, 564-484, on the issue.

"We're extremely pleased with the outcome," said school board President David Weyand. "It's bittersweet because we would have liked both to pass. But, I'm a big fan of the voters have the right to vote on it and we accept the results of that vote."

Superintendent George Kiley was pleased the major building improvement project passed, but disappointed Proposition 2

Kiley was also critical of the 60-percent threshold, which he called burdensome for small city school districts.

"It's unfair. I think it's prejudicial to small cities," Kiley said. "If the same vote happens in Arkport or Alfred-Almond or Bath, it passes."











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
