

Suspect named in Geneva stabbing

GENEVA | Geneva police are looking for the 27-year-old man they believe stabbed two standout high school athletes outside a party Thursday night on Hallenbeck Avenue.

Police have an arrest warrant for Kumar S. Jones, whose last known address is 34 Hallenbeck Ave.

He faces charges of first-degree assault for allegedly stabbing John Archibald and Jeremiah Allen, both 18 and of Geneva.

Police have released few details of the incident.

Police said over the weekend that Archibald was listed in satisfactory condition while Allen was still considered "guarded."

Police said Saturday that the stabbings were related to an argument between one of the victims and another person the day before. A neighbor said as many as 30 teens were in the street near the altercation.

Police stressed that the stabbings were "not related to any other instances within the past year, including last summer's shootings or drug involvement."

Both teens are in their senior year at Geneva High School. Allen excels at football while his close friend, Archibald, is a top basketball player.

High school students research careers at CCC

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CORNING | Hundreds of high school students converged Tuesday on Corning Community College to receive information about more than 40 career opportunities.

CCC hosted the Career Development Council's Focus on Careers seminar. Officials said more than 600 high school sophomores from eight area high schools learned about career paths such as child care, forensics, fashion merchandising and interior decorating.

Officials said this was the 19th year the career seminar has been offered.

A total of 48 presenters held half-hour sessions. Students picked a total of four sessions to attend.

Darlene Squires, a veterinary technician from the Bath Veterinary Hospital, brought Zion, a 14-year-old American staffordshire terrier, to help her demonstrate how veterinary technicians

gently restrain pets while they receive medical care.

"I liken it to holding an infant," Squires said. "It doesn't understand what's going on. They are uncomfortable and don't understand we're not going to hurt them."

Squires also addressed topics such as administering anesthesia, typical salaries for veterinary technicians and prepping animals for surgery.

She said there are more careers open to veterinary technicians than most people know, including careers in research, in the military and in the education fields.

Squires said this is the 15th year she's been a presenter at the career seminar. "I love career day," Squires said. "I wish they had this when I was in school."

Bonnie Blide, of Bonjoulie's Main St. Bride, Prom and Tuxedo Bar, is also a veteran of the career fair. Blide said she's been coming for the past four years.

"The kids are awesome,"

Blide said. "I've run into them years afterward and they remember you and your presentation."

Blide said she focused less on the fashion side of her industry and more on the different aspects of owning and running a small business.

"Those glamour shows drive me insane," Blide said. "They are not about what's real (in the fashion business.)"

Amber Knowles, a student at Campbell-Savona High School, said she found the information sessions helpful.

"I'm looking into a career in forensics and investigation," Knowles said. "That's why I picked the forensics and law enforcement sessions."

Bath sophomore Lisa Cavallaro chose sessions on nursing, veterinary technicians and child care. She said being able to choose sessions relating to four different careers allowed her to explore her different interests.

Candy business can build

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BIG FLATS | A plan to bring a food-processing plant to Airport Corporate Park cleared one of its last hurdles Tuesday when the Big Flats Town Planning Board approved the construction of the building.

The board gave conditional final approval to build the 99,000-square-foot facility, which will house a yet-to-be-identified candy business.

With conditional approval

to begin construction, officials hope to have a final agreement with the company by next week, at which time the business will be identified.

Construction could begin within weeks.

The exact conditions of the approval were not reported, although officials said the businesses' consultants and design engineers must hammer out the fine details of the site plan by April 8 or

Five hurt in Pa. fire

LITCHFIELD, PA. | Fire investigators spent the weekend trying to determine the cause of a blaze that injured five people, one seriously, Saturday night.

Homeowner Henry Lipps was listed in guarded condition at Robert Packer Hospital and four firefighters received minor injuries battling the blaze.

Four people were occupying the home when the fire broke out, said Litchfield Township Fire Chief Joe

The Pennsylvania State Police fire marshal was at the site Sunday to investigate but the cause of the blaze is still undetermined.

The Lipps home, a cinderblock structure, was engulfed and had begun to collapse when firefighters arrived, according to Drake.

"The roof and the floor had caved in, so we couldn't get inside safely," said Drake. "We were worried about the walls collapsing on us."

It took nearly 60 firefighters roughly eight hours to put out the fire.
