## Greenpeace visits Kuhl

**BATH** | Representatives of Greenpeace met with U.S. Rep. John R. "Randy" Kuhl Jr. Thursday to promote the use of clean energy over fossil fuels.

The group visited Kuhl, R-Hammondsport, in his Bath office and delivered approximately 1,000 signed cards urging him to support legislative efforts to curb global warning.

Many of the cards were arranged in the shape of wind turbines – a symbol of reusable energy supported by Greenpeace as an alternative to fossil fuels.

This was the second appearance of the Greenpeace group in as many weeks. The group visited the Corning campaign office of Kuhl's political opponent, Democrat Eric Massa, on Aug. 19. Greenpeace members delivered as many signatures in identical wind-turbine

forms. While not on the premises at the time, Massa has declared himself a supporter of bipartisan legislation to curb carbon emissions linked to global warming.

John Deans, field organizer for Greenpeace, described the signature cards as "a threedimensional petition" just before heading into Kuhl's office for a meeting.

Global warming "is not just affecting the Arctic ... we are asking Congress to take

action," Deans said.

Both Kuhl and Deans described the meeting as productive Kuhl said he supports

Macaluso will join the Naples administration on Sept. 3 and stay until a permanent replacement is found.

Macaluso will retire Aug. 30 after 10 years as superintendent in Seneca Falls.

Deputy Superintendent Brenda Keith said Macaluso's salary should be negotiated by the Sept. 3 board meeting, along with other details of his contract.

Keith served as the district's superintendent for the last four years before resigning Aug. 1. She then signed on as the district's deputy superintendent Aug. 10 and will remain in that position until June 30, 2009.

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# Officials launch Web page on gas drilling

ALBANY | In response to public concerns about a potential gas rush in the Southern Tier and Catskill region, the state Department of Environmental Conservation has launched a Web page with information about the Marcellus Shale.

The page, part of the DEC's larger Web site, has details about drilling processes, leasing, applicable state and federal laws, and potential environmental impacts of gas drilling in the Marcellus Shale, a deep geological for-

mation that stretches from Ohio through West Virginia and into Pennsylvania and New York.

The page includes links to Marcellus Shale maps and links to other pages, such as the DEC's searchable database for existing oil and gas wells.

Numerous public meetings have been held locally to better inform landowners about leases and the push to tap into a large natural gas resource.

## Rabid bat may have bitten dog walker in Ithaca

ITHACA | Authorities are trying to track down a man who was apparently bitten by a rabid bat while walking his dog in a park in central New York.

A resident who lives near Ithaca's Thompson Park says she urged the heavily tattooed man to steer his dog clear of a

bat lying on the ground in the park Sunday. She says the man picked up the bat intending to place it in a tree and it bit him.

She alerted health officials but the dog walker left before they arrived. The bat was later determined to be rabid and officials are appealing for the man to come in for rabies treatment.
