■ U.S. Rep. Eric Massa, D-Corning, toured the Kraft Foods plant in Campbell Monday as part of ongoing efforts to help local industries succeed and to strengthen the local economy. The facility employs about 400 workers and receives 2.5 million pounds of milk per day to make mozzarella and ricotta cheese as well as other well-known products. "I was able to learn more about the specific assets and needs of this plant. Receiving input such as this is critical because it arms me with the knowledge I need to better serve the families of this district," Massa said.

■ In response to ongoing job losses, U.S. Sen. # Former Bath man goes to prison

## First responder guilty of molesting woman in Fla. ambulance

**ST. PETERSBURG, FLA.** | A former first responder in Bath, N.Y., area will spend nearly eight years in a Florida state prison after he was found guilty Monday of molesting a woman.

Patrick Livingston, 39, was sentenced to 7.8 years

in prison after a jury found him guilty Thursday of sexual battery, according to the Pinellas

Livingston was a former president of Bath Ambulance and once worked for Rural/Metro Ambulance Services.

According to the *St. Petersburg Times*, Livingston, then a paramedic with Largo-based Sunstar Paramedics, was arrested July 2, 2008 by the Pinellas County Sheriff's

Office after being accused of assaulting a woman in an ambulance that was taking her to a hospital.

According to the arrest report, Livingston placed his hand in the victim's pants as the ambulance was pulling into the parking lot of Bayfront Medical Center on June 26.

In a police interview, Livingston admitted it was not medically necessary to touch the woman in that manner, according to the *Times*.

Livingston moved to Florida several years ago, according to a local official who worked closely with him in Bath.

## SUNY orders records protected in athletics program probe

**ALBANY** | The State University of New York chancellor has ordered that all records be protected from destruction in the investigation of the athletics program at Binghamton University.

Chancellor Nancy Zimpher issued the order this week as part of an investigation headed by former state Chief Judge Judith Kaye, who has been given wide latitude.

SUNY Board of Trustees Chairman Carl Hayden said that because of Zimpher's immediate action, the NCAA and the America East conference have agreed not to start their own investigations at this time.

Hayden said there would be no "artificial time constraints" on Kaye's investigation, which is now focusing on developing a witness list.

"The investigation is going to proceed without there being any kind of restraints from us," Hayden said, referring to the SUNY Board of Trustees. "It will go where the evidence takes it. It will deal with the integrity of the basketball program, but the charge is sufficiently broad to permit Judge Kaye and her colleagues to look into anything which by implication flows from the facts that are found here."

The chain of events that triggered the probe began in February after a newspaper report raised questions about the character of players coach Kevin Broadus had recruited to the basketball program. Broadus is on a paid leave of absence from his \$217,000 job.

"Going forward, the State University of New York stands for the highest degree of

integrity in its collegiate athletic program," Zimpher told trustees.

"We underscore that we refer to athletes as student athletes for a good reason," she said. "They are in academic study doing academic work and providing great leadership opportunities and entertainment and intercollegiate athletics as well, but we must bring both together at the highest level and I just wanted to pledge my commitment to providing that leadership."

## Reed, Massa disagree on COLA funding

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** | The two candidates for the 29th Congressional District both support President Barack Obama's proposed one-time payment to Social Security recipients, but differ on the source of the money.

The federal government announced last week those who receive Social

Security would not receive a cost of living adjustment – or COLA – due to falling consumer prices, including lower energy costs.

Social Security COLAs are tied to inflation, which has not gone up this year.

The Obama administration, however, has proposed recipients receive a one-time \$250 payment, which, according to the *Wall Street Journal*, would represent an approximately 2 percent increase for the average person on Social Security.

The payment would come from the economic stimulus package.
